THE CHOIR

If you want heart-warming, then you've come to the right place - assuming, that is, that you come to see *The Choir* on Sunday, November 26th at 7.30pm in the Everest Hall. "Last Friday in the Month" Sales

Many thanks to all friends and neighbours, who have supported the sales since the first one in July 2005. We first advertised them as "sales by the garden gate", but after the first two, when we used a large tent on the lawn, it became obvious that the sensible thing to do would be to invite everyone into the kitchen.

Every month we try to offer a good range of preserves. pickles, chutneys jam etc. and a selection of freshly made breads, bread rolls and cakes. So far we have had only one complete sell out, so it is worth coming along.

In the fourteen months from July 2005 to August 2006, £1250 has been raised. We send the money each month to one of the trustees of the Little Sisters in Jesus Trust, an Anglican Franciscan organisation running the convent and orphanage at Fiwila in Central Zambia. Every penny raised goes to Fiwila to support the work there. In January this year we were able to show a DVD, filmed at Fiwila, showing the children at play, their living and working areas and some of the conservation farming methods. The news from Fiwila is good - here is a quote from the July newsletter:

"We have had a wonderful year - enough maize grown and gathered, to feed us all until next year.

Our vegetables are growing well and the children's hut gardens are also producing their meals. We have prepared the fields for October sowing and have to collect the lime for the conservation holes. Much work done and to be done!

May the Lord's blessing be upon you all.

Offa's Hike

An account of two weeks spent as a Saxon

My name is Alex – I'm an eighteen year old History student from Llanfair, but for two weeks this August I swapped identities with an 8th Century Mercian king of some renown – Offa. Dressed, equipped, sheltered and fed much as Offa would have been, I set out to walk the entire length of the Offa's Dyke Path – just short of two hundred miles. But what drove me to undertake such a task? I would like to say that it was my love for history (and perhaps to a greater extent, dressing up), and, although there is some truth in that, my most pressing reason was to raise money for a Raleigh International project in Costa Rica and Nicaragua that I will be working on next February, for which I have to raise £2,700.

What did this epic trek involve? Casting my mind back, blisters, black legs (running dye rather than something medical, thankfully), head lice, fleas, the hundreds of stiles that proliferate along the path's length (I've lost count of the number of times I split my underwear scrambling over the things) and sodden clothes spring readily to mind, but there was more to it than that. The considerable distance was made more challenging by the disappointingly dreary weather (it rained for twelve

days out of fifteen), my lack of 'proper' walking boots and my initial (foolishly optimistic) decision to make the attempt wearing a knee-length jacket of ringmail, which weighs just under two stone on its own.

However, what I thought would pose the biggest problem – the clothing – actually turned out to be surprisingly well-suited to the conditions I faced. The linen shirts and underwear dried out quickly when wet (and remained comfortable even then), and the wool cloak and hauberk (padded jacked) kept me warm, even when I was soaked to the bone (a depressingly frequent occurrence). Indeed, a couple geared up with Gore-Tex and other modern kit actually gave up halfway through, since their clothing had become too uncomfortable in the near-constant rain!

Did I gain anything from this experience? I like to think that I have – the walk tested my physical capabilities as well as my strength of will, and having overcome the obstacles I think I now 'know myself' a little better for it. The memory of the experience too is, and will remain, very valuable personally to me – the memory of the fantastic (if often fog-shrouded), expansive scenery, and the satisfaction of finishing on a sunny day by walking into the sea at Prestatyn, will be one I cherish.

But I didn't do all this on my own – my (positively saintly) mother dropped off a canvas flysheet with my next day's provisions, etc. every night, and I would occasionally walk for a section of the earthwork alongside other walkers. The scarcity of conversational partners along the bulk of the Dyke's length made the little chit-chat I had all the more enjoyable, from the group of Brummies who, in the mist, mistook me for a druid, to the kid in Prestatyn who (upon noticing my outlandish appearance) commented: 'Ooh, very 1977...' – strange, I know, but true.

Looking back, I thoroughly recommend that if you haven't already walked along some or all of its length (and even if you have – the experience changes dramatically with the weather, trust me!), you take the time to do so, be it the stretch past Knighton (one of the best!), or a whole weekend's walking. Go on – you never know who you might meet...

Finally, I would like to thank everyone in the valley who has sponsored me - thanks to them, I have been able to raise over £1,600 towards the project.
